





- 6. SECURE YOUR FLIPBOOK WITH A BINDER CLIP ON THE LEFT AND FLIP THROUGH TO SEE THE ANIMATION.



Have you ever wondered how your favourite cartoons come to life? From the classic Mickey Mouse to modern animated series, cartoons have come a long way! Let's take a fun journey through time to see how cartoons are made—from their very beginning to the amazing animation of today!

The Early Days of Cartoons

long time ago, before TV Α and computers, people created moving pictures using something called а zoetrope. This was a spinning drum with pictures inside. When it turned, the images appeared to move! It was like a magic trick for the eyes!

Then came hand-drawn animation in the early 1900s. Artists would draw thousands of pictures by hand, slightly changing each one. When these drawings were shown quickly in a row, it looked like the characters were moving! Famous cartoons like Mickey Mouse and Looney Tunes were made this way.

The Rise of Cel Animation

In the 1930s, animators found a new way to make cartoons faster. They used cel animation—where characters were drawn on clear sheets of plastic (called cels) and placed over painted backgrounds. This meant artists didn't have to redraw everything for each scene, making cartoons much quicker to create!

This method gave us amazing animated movies like Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs (1937), the first full-length animated film!

Stop-Motion Animation: A Different Style

While most cartoons were drawn, another cool technique called stop-motion animation was also used. Instead of drawings, artists used clay figures or (cont.)

puppets. They took a picture, moved the figure a tiny bit, and took another picture. Doing this many times created movement!

The Arrival of Computers – Digital Animation!

By the 1990s, computers changed everything! Digital animation allowed animators to create characters and backgrounds on a computer instead of drawing by hand. This saved time and made animations even smoother and more detailed.

Then came 3D animation, where characters looked more realistic and could move

in all directions. Movies like Toy Story (1995) and Frozen (2013) were made using 3D computer animation!

How Cartoons Are Made Today!

Today, cartoons are created using supersmart computers and special software. But the process still follows the same steps:

1) Story & Characters: Writers come up with a fun story and create the characters.

2) Storyboarding: Artists draw comic-like scenes to plan how the story will look.

3) Animation: Animators use computers to bring the characters to life, making them move and talk.


4) Adding Sounds: Voice actors record character voices, and sound effects like footsteps or explosions are added.

5) Final Touches: Colours, lighting, and special effects are added to make everything look amazing!

With new technology like artificial intelligence (AI) and virtual reality (VR), the future of cartoons is super exciting! Maybe one day, you'll be able to step inside your favourite cartoon and become part of the adventure! Cartoons have evolved from simple drawings to amazing digital creations, but one thing has never changedthey always bring joy and fun to kids everywhere!
