Different Places, Different Pouses

People all over the world live in different kinds of houses, shaped by their culture, weather, and way of life. Some live in apartments, while others have bungalows or terrace houses. In Kashmir, many people live in houseboats, floating on beautiful lakes.

In some places, homes are built on stilts to stay safe from floods. These are called stilt houses or Tang-ghar, found in places like Assam and Thailand. In Kerala, people build Nalukettu houses with a big open courtyard in the center to keep the house cool. In Korea, Hanok houses have sloped roofs and wooden floors to stay warm in winter and cool in summer. Central



Asian nomads in Kyrgyzstan lived in yurts, which are tents that are movable and made from animal hides.

In snowy regions like Poland, Zakopane houses have steep roofs to prevent heavy snow from piling up. While in icy places like Iceland or Canada, some communities and outdoor enthusiasts live in igloos. To keep the people inside the igloos warm from the severe winds, they are carved out of compressed and insulating snow to form ice houses. To keep the interior warm, the residents must kindle a fire.

In deserts, people build mud-brick houses to stay cool. In Tunisia, Matmata is associated with cave houses. These houses are one-of-a-kind, unlike any other. In order to protect individuals from the blazing North African heat and the severe desert winds, cave shelters are quite helpful.

No matter where you go, houses are built in special ways to suit the place and the people living there!







THE SCIENCE OF BUILDING A STRONG HOME

Have you ever thought about what makes a house strong and safe? The materials used to build a home play a big part in its strength. Let's explore how homes are built and the different materials that help make them sturdy!

BUILDING MATERIALS: THE BASICS

1. Wood:

Wood is one of the oldest building materials. It's light, easy to shape, and strong enough to make walls and roofs. Many cabins and traditional homes are made of wood, especially in places with lots of forests.

3. Concrete:

Concrete is a mix of sand, cement, and water that hardens over time. It's super strong and is often used to make foundations, the part of the home that keeps it steady on the ground.

2. Brick:

Bricks are tiny but mighty! They are made by baking clay until it hardens. Bricks are used to make walls and keep homes cool in summer and warm in winter.

4.Eco-Friendly Materials:

Did you know there are materials that are good for the planet? Builders are now using bamboo, recycled steel, and even straw to create homes that are eco-friendly and durable.







WHY DO WE USE DIFFERENT MATERIALS?

Different places and climates need different materials to build strong homes. For example:

- In hot deserts, people use clay and mud to keep houses cool.
- In cold places, homes are made of materials like wood to keep warmth inside.
- Near oceans, homes are built with strong materials like concrete to stand up to wind and water.

WHAT YOU NEED:

- Popsicle sticks or LEGO bricks
- Clay or glue
- A small fan or hair dryer (to test your structure!)

- l. Use the popsicle sticks or LEGO bricks to build a house or tower.
- 2. Try different designs—make one tall and thin, and another short and wide.
- 3. Test your creations by turning on the fan. Which structure stands strong? Which one falls?

Through this experiment, you'll learn about stability and why certain shapes and materials work best for building strong homes.



2 KITCHEN ROLLS, 3 TOILET PAPER ROLLS, CARDBOARD BOX, GLUE, STICKERS, PAINT. HARD PAPER SHEETS

How to Make:

- 1. PAINT YOUR BOX AND ROLLS IN ANY COLOUR YOU LIKE. DRAW A DOOR ON EACH PIECE.
- 2. STICK YOUR KITCHEN ROLLS ON BOTH SIDES
 OF THE BOX TOWARDS THE BACK AND TWO TOILET PAPER ROLLS ON
 BOTH SIDES TOWARD THE FRONT. MAKE SURE THE TOP OPENING OF
 THE BOX ACTS AS A DOOR AND IS FACING THE FRONT.
- 3. PASTE THE THIRD TOILET PAPER ROLL ON THE TOP OF THE BOX.
- 4. CUT OUT A QUARTER OF A CIRCLE FROM A PIECE OF PAPER AND ROLL IT INTO A CONE.

 MAKE SURE IT'S BIG ENOUGH TO COVER THE TOP OF A TOILET PAPER ROLL. ONCE THE CONE IS FORMED, SECURE IT ONTO THE TOP OF THE TOILET PAPER ROLL ON THE TOP OF THE BOX.
- 5. After the castle has dried, decorate it with stickers, glitter or drawings.
- 6. NEXT, TAKE A CARDBOARD/HARD PAPER SHEET AND STICK THE CASTLE ON TOP OF IT SO THE BOARD ACTS AS A BASE.

A smart home is one that is connected to the internet and enables remote control, monitoring, and management of domestic devices via gadgets like laptops, tablets, and smartphones.





Steps:

- 1 Clean jars or use sturdy paper cups. Decorate them and label with the plant's name, like "Basil."
- Place small stones or pebbles at the bottom for proper drainage.
- Add potting soil to the container, leaving a little space at the top.
- Sprinkle seeds on the soil and cover lightly as per the seed packet's instructions.

- 5 Lightly moisten the soil with a spray bottle or small watering can. Don't overwater.
- 6 Place your mini garden in a sunny spot, like a windowsill. Plants need sunlight to grow.
- Water when the soil feels dry. Soon, tiny sprouts will appear.


