

Life of Rabindranath Tagore

Rabindranath Tagore was a poet, writer, composer, playwright, philosopher, social reformer and a painter. Rabindranath Tagore was born on 7th May 1861 in Jorasanko Thakurbari, Kolkata (Calcutta) to Debendranath Tagore and Sarada Devi. He was the youngest of 13 siblings. Tagore was raised mostly by servants because his mother had died in his early childhood and his father travelled widely. Despite being born in an educated family, Tagore did not attend school and rather received education at home. Although, in 1878 he was sent to England for formal schooling, but he left his studies midway. Tagore started his career by writing short stories in 1877, when he was only 16 yrs old. His first story was 'Bhikharini' (The Beggar Women). At the age of 16, he released his first substantial poems under the pseudonym Bhānusiṃha ("Sun Lion"), which were seized upon by literary authorities as long-lost classics. By 1877, he graduated to his first short stories and dramas, published under his real name. Rabindranath Tagore got married on 9 December 1883 to Mrinalini Devi, when she was 9 and Tagore was 22 yrs old.

A Biography.....

Together they had 5 children - Rathindranath, Shamindranath, Renuka, Madhurilata and Meera. In 1905, Tagore wrote 'Amar Sonar Bangla'. After a few years on 11th December 1911, Rabindranath wrote the famous song 'Jana Gana Mana' that was later adopted as our National Anthem. In 1912, Tagore translated his 1910 work 'Gitanjali' into English. In 1913, Rabindranath Tagore became the first non-European person to get the Nobel Prize for Literature. He was awarded a knighthood by King George V in the 1915 Birthday Honours, but Tagore renounced it after the 1919 Jallianwala Bagh massacre. In 1919, he was invited by the president and chairman of Anjuman-e-Islamia, Syed Abdul Majid, to visit Sylhet for the first time. The event attracted over 5000 people. After many more years of life, Tagore died on 7th August 1941 due to severe uraemia and a blocked urinary bladder. Rabindranath Tagore helped introduce Indian culture to the West and vice versa in early 20th century.



World to prepare for El Niño - WMO

El Niño weather phenomenon is likely to strike back this year during May-September, according to a new update by the World Meteorological Organization (WMO). The WMO said that El Niño would push the global temperatures up bringing extreme weather across the world. The El Niño weather patterns are usually associated with severe droughts, heat waves as well as extreme rain is several parts of the world. The WMO team predicts normal to below normal rainfall over much of South Asia during the 2023 southwest monsoon season (June-September). Temperatures may rise above normal over most parts of South Asia. This may lead to a new spike in global heating and increase the chance of breaking temperature records. The rising ocean temperatures can cause damage to aquatic life and corals.

Cooler start to the Indian Summer


May 1, 2023, was the coolest ever in India since 1951 pointing to the odd climate change pattern. An unusually cold start to the summer is likely to persist for a couple more weeks in the northern part of India. This may affect the monsoon onset or its strength. Worryingly, February 2023 was the 13th hottest in the India Meteorological Department's (IMD) dataset. But, March 2023 was the 11th coolest March, while April 2023 was the 4th coolest April since 1951. This has caused a delayed summer in India impacting agricultural produce.





3. Try to understand others.


You should make an effort to understand the point of view of other people.

Materials:

METAL RINGS OF VARIOUS SIZES, COLOURFUL THREADS, ARTIFICIAL FEATHERS, BEADS, GLUE, SCISSORS.

How to Make

STEP 1: TAKE A FEW THREADS AND TIGHTLY WRAP THEM AROUND THE METAL RINGS.

MAKE A KNOT AND SECURE THE THREAD IN PLACE WITH GLUE.

STEP 2: TAKE ANOTHER THREAD AND WEAVE IT INSIDE THE METAL RING IN A BEAUTIFUL PATTERN AS PER YOUR LIKING. YOU MAY ADD BEADS IN BETWEEN THE PATTERN.

STEP 3: REPEAT STEP 2 FOR ALL THE OTHER RINGS.


STEP 4: TIE THE METAL RINGS TOGETHER IN ANY FORMATION YOU LIKE.

STEP 5: THREAD A BEAD INTO A NEW STRING AND ATTACH FEATHERS TO IT AND SECURE THEM WITH THREAD AND GLUE.

STEP 6: MAKE SEVERAL OF THESE AND THEN TIE THEM TO THE METAL RINGS.

STEP 7: MAKE A LOOP AND TIE IT TO THE TOP OF THE DREAM CATCHER.

STEP 8: LET THE GLUE DRY. NOW YOUR DREAMCATCHER IS READY.
